


## Skills and Strategies for Reading (Overview)

Use these “fix-up” strategies to understand and remember what you read.

<p><b>PREVIEW:</b> Get a sense of a text before reading.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Look for clues in the title, subheadings, and graphics.</li> <li>• Skim opening paragraphs.</li> </ul>	<p><b>PREDICT:</b> Guess what will happen.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Note details about plot or characters that hint about where the story is headed.</li> <li>• Keep reading to find out whether your guess was right.</li> </ul>
<p><b>SET A PURPOSE:</b> Decide why you are reading.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ask: Am I reading for information, entertainment, or another reason?</li> <li>• Your purpose may affect how you approach a text—for example, whether you take notes on it.</li> </ul>	<p><b>VISUALIZE:</b> Create a mental picture.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Look for details about people, places, and events.</li> <li>• Use these details to form a vivid scene in your mind’s eye.</li> </ul> 
<p><b>CONNECT:</b> Relate personally to what you read.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Think about whether you know similar people, places, or problems.</li> <li>• Consider how you would act in the same situation.</li> </ul>	<p><b>MONITOR:</b> Check your comprehension as you read.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Clarify your understanding by rereading difficult parts or asking for help.</li> <li>• Evaluate how well you understand the text.</li> </ul>
<p><b>USE PRIOR KNOWLEDGE:</b> Think of what you already know about the topic.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Before reading, jot down what you already know.</li> <li>• As you read, connect what you know to what you are learning.</li> </ul>	<p><b>MAKE INFERENCES:</b> Develop logical guesses based on the text and your own experiences.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Notice details in the text.</li> <li>• Think about how common sense and your past experiences can help you understand the character or situation.</li> </ul>
